

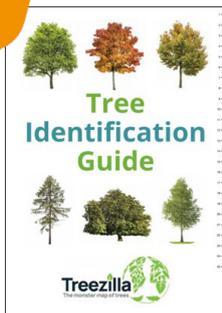
Tree identification resources



As a Tree Warden, tree identification is a core skill which can take many years to refine. Recognising different tree species is usually best learnt in the field at first in the company of an expert. Seek out opportunities for guided walks or training workshops taking place near you. If you are just starting out on your own, it's a good idea to get to know the trees in your local area first. Look out for them on your daily walk or commute and take the time to look up their leaves, bark, flowers or form in a tree ID book or use an online resource. You will soon start to recognise them and enjoy the changes they experience throughout the season. Here are some resources which may help.

The Treezilla Tree Identification Guide uses leaves as the principal means by which to identify a tree, so it will work best when the tree is in leaf. During the winter, you may find fallen leaves you can use.

Pl@ntNet is an app that allows you to identify plants simply by photographing them with your smartphone. It uses artificial intelligence to guess the plant species based on its database of images.

iSpot is a citizen science platform for biodiversity aimed at helping anyone identify anything in nature. A large community of experts will help you identify trees based on your photos.

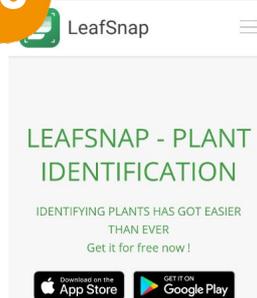
