The Tree Council has experienced fantastic growth in the past year. Following investment into a rebrand and website redevelopment, The Tree Council has secured funding to deliver several major projects to plant, protect and speak up for trees and hedgerows across the UK.

It is also a vital moment for our environment. The public is increasingly aware of the important role trees play in tackling climate change, protecting and improving biodiversity and contributing to our health and wellbeing, amongst many other things.

This is an exciting time to shape the future for UK trees. As Communications Manager, you will help consolidate our ambitious plans, co-ordinate our comms and policy work, and support our key projects.

You will have knowledge of the broad communications remit, as well as experience working to generate successful media coverage and influence policymakers. You will have excellent organisational skills and be a strong communicator, committed to working in a small dynamic team, in a fast-paced environment.

Attention to detail, a positive outlook and tenacity will be key. Above all, you should be passionate about the environment and making lasting change.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Support the delivery and growth of the charity's comms programme with a focus on media and public affairs activity

- Working with the Head of Comms & Policy, develop and co-ordinate a media strategy, covering traditional and online media, broadcast, radio and blogs.
- Respond effectively and efficiently to incoming media requests.
- Proactively source and develop media opportunities to raise awareness of The Tree Council's work, both in general and in relation to specific programmes and our seasonal campaigns, such as National Tree Week and National Hedgerow Week.
- Develop The Tree Council's photo and content library, including establishing a filing system and sourcing compelling new images and case studies.
- Lead on media monitoring and share coverage regularly with the wider Tree Council team.
- Manage the 'News & Views' section of The Tree Council's website.
- Support the Head of Comms & Policy with other key activities including social media, the website and newsletters.

Provide communications support across The Tree Council team - particularly to the Hedgerows – 'Close the Gap' and National Schools programmes

- Working with the Head of Comms & Policy, support these projects with communications planning and delivery on an ongoing basis.
- Provide general communications support to The Tree Council team, including copywriting, proofreading, phone monitoring and event organisation using meetings and webinars on digital platforms such as MS Teams and Zoom.

Support the development of The Tree Council's charity coalition group and role as an expert in the sector

- Work with the Head of Comms and Policy to review and develop communications with our charity coalition group.
- Design and deliver a minimum of four meetings a year for coalition members (online and face-to-face) on topics relating for example to government consultations, training, National Tree Week collaboration and best practice – this role may include coordinating the group's policy or consultation responses.
- Help with background research to inform current and future policy work.
- Lead on communications for science and research projects such as our forthcoming Local Tree Strategy toolkit.

The Tree Council team works in a collegiate way, delivering projects together. As a result, there is regular cross-over and collaboration. Each project has a designated leader who takes responsibility for driving, maintaining and monitoring progress.

THE TREE COUNCIL - WHO WE ARE

The Tree Council is a charity (charity no. 279000) and umbrella body bringing everyone together with a shared mission to care for trees and our planet's future. We inspire and empower organisations, government, communities and individuals with the knowledge and tools to create positive, lasting change at a national and local level.

We inspire people to plant and care for trees – the trees in your city street, your local park or school playground, in orchards and hedgerows and rural pastures around the UK. (Other charities focus on forests and larger woodlands.) We celebrate our 50th anniversary in 2023.

Following a very successful National Tree Week campaign in 2019, which raised significant funds for tree planting, we are at an important stage in our development, with ambitious plans for the future.

Our work includes:

- Support for a network of thousands of volunteer Tree Wardens and a growing force of Young Tree Champions who help plant and establish trees in communities around England, Scotland and Wales.
- An annual community programme, which connects people with trees and the natural world, including 'National Tree Week' each November
- A grants programme that helps schools and other groups fulfil their vision to plant trees, orchards and hedgerows
- Science and social research programme in partnership with Defra
- An important relationship with Network Rail as their 'critical friend'. We advise on vegetation management along 20,000 miles of railway corridors and deliver a multi-million pound Network Rail community planting programme over the next three years.
- Partnerships with our 120 Member organisations, including other charities such as the Woodland Trust and Trees for Cities; academic partners such as Newcastle and Strathclyde Universities; and generous supporters including businesses, major donors and Trusts & Foundations.
